STATE OF THE ART



Cleveland's Foundation in Arts & Culture

Inside opulent vaudeville-style theaters, nestled inside former industrial factories and tucked away in colorful neighborhoods, Cleveland's world-class arts and culture scene emerges before visitors' eyes. Whether ogling over a modern masterpiece, admiring the work of a local artist or tapping their toes to the beat, vistors will encounter boundless creativity and talent throughout their Cleveland experience.

New and Noteworthy

- The Museum of Contemporary Art (moCa)'s show, "Double Takes: Historic and Contemporary Film + Video," invites guests to embark on a journey of movement, sights and sounds. Pairing some of the industry's most seminal work with contemporary pieces that present emerging global voices on urgent issues, this exhibit forces visitors to take a second look at how they view the purpose of art and film.
- As part of the city's commemoration of the 50th anniversary of the last Cuyahoga River fire, <u>Cleveland Museum of Art</u> presents Cai Guo-Qiang: Cuyahoga River Lightning. Known for his explosion events, gunpowder paintings and installations, all using environmentally friendly material, Chinese artist Cai Guo-Qiang presents three works in monochrome and polychrome gunpowder, including one created especially for Cleveland.
- The Cleveland Museum of Art's cutting-edge <u>ARTLENS Gallery</u> allows visitors to get hands-on with the museum's collection. They can create original artwork in the ArtLens Studio, engage with touchscreen-free digital interactives in the ArtLens Exhibition and connect with the museum's collection at the ArtLens Wall. Visitors can even use the ArtLens App to save photos and map their visit at the museum.
- After garnering a sense of place through the <u>Cleveland Starts Here®</u> exhibit, visitors to the Cleveland History Center can enjoy the center's newest exhibit, *Si Jolie! French Fashion in Cleveland*. Fashion lovers and museum guests can explore how Clevelanders showed off their style at cultural venues like the Euclid Avenue Opera and can expect to see pieces that range from the 1870s to today, including items from the golden age of Dior (the 1950s), Hermès, Yves Saint Laurent, Louis Vuitton and more.

A Work of Art

- The <u>Cleveland Museum of Art</u> is one of the only nationally recognized art museums to offer free admission to its permanent collection, which features more than 45,000 pieces of art from artists like Dali. Monet and Warhol.
- The <u>Museum of Contemporary Art Cleveland</u> showcases an ever-changing and free-to-all collection of exhibits, ranging from photos and sculpture to audio works and video productions. Designed by renowned British architect Farshid Moussavi, the four-story building rises 60 feet from a hexagonal base to a square top and is clad primarily in mirror-finish black stainless steel reflecting its urban surroundings and changing in appearance with differences in light and weather.
- Residing at the Cleveland Institute of Art, the <u>Cinematheque</u> is recognized as one of the country's best repertory movie theaters, showing independent and foreign films as well as revived classics.
- Cleveland's art scene does not stop at museums. Independent artists showcase their work at venues like 78th Street Studios in the Detroit-Shoreway neighborhood, SPACES gallery in the Ohio City neighborhood and the historic Transformer Station in Hingetown, which is located in a 1924 railroad substation.
- The Collinwood community and its emerging <u>Waterloo Arts District</u> offers a half-mile stretch of indie music venues, art galleries and studios, including <u>Azure Stained Glass Studio</u>, <u>BRICK Ceramics + Design Studio</u>, <u>Space: ROCK</u> and show-stopping metal sculptures at <u>Waterloo 7 Studio/Gallery</u>. Musicians, photographers, writers and other artists who reside in the neighborhood have helped transform the community into an engaging and welcoming hub of creativity.

Hitting the Right Note

- Under the direction of Franz Wesler-Möst, the world-renowned <u>Cleveland Orchestra</u> offers pitchperfect programs that hit the right note with visitors. The ensemble plays seasonally at Severance Hall in University Circle and within the perimeter of the Cuyahoga Valley National Park at Blossom Music Center during the summer.
- In addition to its standard repertoire, <u>The Cleveland Orchestra</u> incorporates innovative programming, which means visitors will find them hosting happy hour-style concerts on select Fridays, playing movies scores in conjunction with a live film, performing mini residencies within Cleveland's urban neighborhoods and partnering with ballets, operas and other national artists.
- Severance Hall, home of the Cleveland Orchestra since 1931, is known as one of the most beautiful concert halls in the world. Its elegant Georgian exterior harmonizes with the classical architecture of other prominent buildings in the University Circle neighborhood while the interior of the building reflects a combination of design styles, including Art Deco, Egyptian Revival, Classicism and Modernism. The building received the Honor Award by the National Trust for Historic Preservation. Free tours are available on select days.
- Founded in 1996, <u>The Cleveland POPS Orchestra</u> performs in different venues throughout Cleveland, taking on modern-day composers like John Williams, Rodgers and Hammerstein and Gershwin.

Taking Lenter Stage

- <u>Playhouse Square</u> is the country's largest performing arts center outside of New York City, encompassing ten stages in a one-block radius. It hosts more than 1,000 performances annually including Broadway shows, concerts, ballets and comedy events.
- The Tony Award-winning <u>Cleveland Play House</u> hails as America's first professional regional theater company and produces more than 500 performances each year.
- Boasting alums like Tom Hanks and Arthur Lithgow, <u>Great Lakes Theater</u> is Cleveland's classic theater company residing in Playhouse Square's renovated Hanna Theatre.
- Located on Cleveland's east side, the <u>Karamu House</u> is the oldest African American theater in the nation.
- <u>Cleveland Public Theatre</u> in the Gordon Square Arts District is a local hub for progressive theater, modern dance and edgy opera submitted by both regional and national artists.

Art Activities

- Stilt walkers, life-sized puppets, colorful floats, dancers and musicians comprise the annual free event in Cleveland's University Circle neighborhood, <u>Parade the Circle</u>. Every June, visitors can watch the parade, partake in creative activities, enjoy live entertainment and nosh on great food offerings in the Circle Village.
- With four floors of art, music, food and architecture, <u>Third Fridays at 78th Street Studios</u> in the Detroit Shoreway neighborhood showcases the work of independent Cleveland artists, makers and designers.
- On the first Friday of every month, galleries and restaurants stay open late for Walk All Over Waterloo
 in the Collinwood neighborhood. While on the second Friday of every month in the Tremont
 neighborhood, visitors can meander through the galleries and shops and check out street performers
 and pop-up art at Walkabout Tremont. The Little Italy Art Walk gives visitors the chance to ooh and
 aah at the works of art studios and galleries displayed on the neighborhood's sidewalks during select
 months of the year.
